Grant us, compassionate God, a faith that truly sets us free, that is new and hopeful, vibrant and alive, discerning and full of life and love, in Jesus name.

And in that hope we hear your words of assurance, that you, our God, made known in Christ Jesus, never move from absolute love and truth. A new day is always offered to us and the encouragement which grace brings. For we are God's beloved people. **Thanks be to God.**

## Readings

First Reading Deuteronomy 30:15-20

See, I have set before you today life and prosperity, death and adversity.

Second Reading 1 Corinthians 3:1-9 On Divisions in the Corinthian Church

And so, brothers and sisters, I could not speak to you as spiritual people, but rather as people of the flesh, as infants in Christ. I fed you with milk, not solid food, for you were not ready for solid food. Even now you are still not ready, for you are still of the flesh. For as long as there is jealousy and quarrelling among you, are you not of the flesh, and behaving according to human inclinations? For when one says, 'I belong to Paul', and another, 'I belong to Apollos', are you not merely human?

What then is Apollos? What is Paul? Servants through whom you came to believe, as the Lord assigned to each. I planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the growth. So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth. The one who plants and the one who waters have a common purpose, and each will receive wages according to the labour of each. For we are God's servants, working together; you are God's field, God's building.

#### Sermon

We pray: Open us, guide us, teach us we pray O God that we may hear your truth in mind and heart- and live in loving relationship with you and each other. In Jesus name. Amen

Last week, we talked about the times when we lose our way because we have imposed human wisdom on the purpose of God – when we have failed to be the God-flavoured salt, the God-coloured light to the world. This week we continue that theme as we talk about our relationship with the law or the wisdom of God and how we keep our understandings of Gods purpose for us fresh and vital and on track.

Way back in the day, when I was looking to reconnect with my faith as an adult in the wonderful metropolis of Amberley, I had to choose from the local church community the one that would become my home. I knew it had to be local and there was no Methodist church (my origins) so it was Anglican, New Life or Presbyterian – and it was the Presbyterian that drew me in over and above the other – and why - because of the reformed and reforming cornerstone that anchored the denomination. I liked that we always asked questions, seeking to discern what Jesus was saying to us, I liked that we were continually trying to examine where we were at as a people of faith, always seeking to interpret God's Word for our time. I especially liked that many voices were heard and respected and that together we grew and matured as Christians. I liked the concept of the minister being the teaching elder, not the fount of all knowledge and really like the concept of eldership, guiding and holding the collective wisdom of the faith community. So - Presbyterian it was!

And my faith has matured and grown in that soil of wide-ranging conversations, shared discernment, troublesome questions and vulnerable answers. But above all, it was about the understanding that the reformed church never sits on its laurels but is always re-forming, always questioning who it needs to be to walk faithfully in the way of Christ, forever challenging and unpacking who we are be as Christ followers. You could say that Jesus was a reformer. He came to interpret God's law in a new way – not to change or banish the law of Yahweh but to bring people to fresh understanding of what these commandments mean. He was often accused by his critics of sweeping the Law aside, of not taking the commandments seriously but in fact what he was doing was sweeping away the layers of human wisdom that has almost obliterated these holy commandments, leading the people away from their God.

Jesus spent much of his time in ministry on this earth deconstructing the micro-management that the church had built around God's commandments to Moses, seeking instead to get back to the core of what God's covenant with the people was actually about..

Matthew's Gospel tells us in Chapter 5 how, in the sermon on the Mount, Jesus is assuring the people he had not come to demolish the Law but to fulfil it – and he then preached on interpreting the ancient commandments in a new way: for example: You have heard it said: you shall not murder.....but I say to you, you shall not hate or harbour anger... and he proceeds to unpack the heart of the laws given on Mt Sinai, to challenge the legalistic understanding of the people and to open their hearts to the abundant vision that is God's purpose for this world.

It's not as if the prophets of the Hebrew Scriptures weren't on to this as well. The people of the exile well understood that constant vigilance was needed to follow God's law – Moses speaks in Deuteronomy of the chaos if you don't obey the law given by God but note that he sees the law as only being fulfilled in the context of the love of God in your heart – it's when the heart turns away from God that the law gets compromised and bad stuff happens. When the people of the exile interpreted the law through lust or greed or power, then they had effectively turned their back on their Lord.

Paul too has this ongoing problem in Corinth – and is forced to use some very straight talking. Because of their continuing quarrelling and jealousy, he likens their spiritual maturity to that of a child, fit only to be fed on milk, not yet ready for solids. That must have been as good a put down as it comes for that day. To describe grown men and women as no better than infants would not have been well received. Basically Paul suggests that, based on their current behaviour, they are still at school, and in the primers as well. He continues by telling them that as long as they follow human wisdom instead of the wisdom of the Spirit they will make poor judgements and false claims of truth and be a divided people.

But if they come together as one people in common purpose in the name of Christ, it's like a garden where some will plant, some will water, but all the growth comes from God - and it will be abundant. Very good words for us today

A law, as we well know in our culture today, only serves justice when it is interpreted in light of its purpose. A law serves its intention, not the other way round. And we all know that a law meant for justice can be manipulated for injustice. People are always pushing the edges of the law for their own benefit. For instance with the law around taxes (and this is my definition) – the intention is that all contribute to the social good, health, roads, schools, housing, infrastructure, democracy, etc etc. When people with a lot of money find legal ways to avoid doing that are they accepting the intention of the law? I think not.

Moses, Jesus, Paul and we would and should have called out that behaviour saying that the interpretation of the law was flawed and its heart of compassion and justice was being trodden on.

Jesus called out the leaders in the church wherever he saw the love of God constrained by the laws of the church – no healing on Sunday, unclean food, ignoring the downtrodden and the unclean.

Jesus re-formed the commandments into just two – love the Lord your God with everything you have and love your neighbour as yourself. On these two commandments, he said, hang all the law and the prophets.'

Paul tells us we are to be forever on guard against choices we make that that isolate us from the way of the cross, choices that seem to have lost the Jesus factor and sit rigidly in human certainty. I can think of a few and I am sure you can too.

How do we obey the commandment of God today without falling into the trap of manipulating it to suit our ends as the church time and time again has done?

The Psalmist talks about it – how learning to walk the path of right living with God is something we will need to work at and learn and grow in else we will go astray. The metaphor that Paul uses of being as children seeking always to learn and grow and seek, of being willing pupils is a helpful one too I believe.

Pupil or teacher, we are to be questioning and learning, alert to the ways we might curtail Jesus teaching into our own comfortable purpose. We remember that we do not know it all, there is never a time when we can simply abide by the rules but we are to be continually discussing, learning, growing from each other, with those who know much and those who would say they know nothing but in fact have a profound faith. Look around – think of the people here who have been teachers for you, those whose journey with God had impacted on your journey, whose faithfulness gives you hope and whose gifts have been, and will be, light and salt for you.

The learning and growing, the re-formation never stops —we are forever seeking to discern how we are to live as the people of God in true and faithful community interpreting scripture in the power of the Spirit, opening our heart to the truth that is that is Jesus Christ in this world today.

We finish with some of the words from Ps 119 — used in the call to worship

Sacred are they that pay attention to Wisdom, seeking God's inner voice with all their heart. Steadfast are those who walk the path of God's love for they shall not be confounded, they will respect the whole of God's counsel. And for this we say thanks be to God. Amen
