Pay attention!



I find autumn is an easy time to pay attention - the light is so rich, the leaves changing colour, different trees shedding their leaves at different times. Paying attention is a good way to be grounded in God - whether it is in the wonder of Creation or in our relationships with one another.

Children can often model paying attention, being present in the moment in a way that we sometimes lose touch with. Last week one of our Jitterbugs children saw something in our Norfolk Island Hibiscus tree. The adults gathered around and followed his pointing finger and there was a big fat kereru - the first time I had seen one in our yard. Soon, quite a group of excited adults were pointing up into the tree and enjoying the sight of this beautiful bird.

In the stories we have been reading from the Book of Acts, God, through the Holy Spirit, has been paying attention, making sure that people encounter the people they need to to transform their lives. The Holy Spirit has a lot of work to do to link the apostle Peter with the gentile Cornelius. Peter has a rooftop vision, three men arrive together to accompany him to Cornelius' house, Cornelius and all his family are at home when Peter and his companions arrive. And Peter, Cornelius and the leaders of the church are all transformed by the encounter.

Henri Nouwen, one of my spiritual guides, says this 'Pay attention to the people God puts in your path if you want to discern what God is up to in your life.' I have recently started another Adventure in Mission with people from all over the country. One member of the group is trying to discern which of the many parts of her life God is inviting her to travel with for a

time. One of those is a school. As she spoke with us, she said 'Well, I met with someone from school the other day for a coffee. Then another woman from school got in touch with me and asked if I would have a coffee with them. Then I bumped into someone else from school.... I was wondering if God is trying to tell me to work with my school, or if he has something else in mind.' We all laughed. It is not often we get three people lined up wanting to talk with us about the same things.

The people God puts in our path are not always delightful! Sometimes they are challenging and the shift in perspective they put before us can be confronting. But they will help us discern what God is up to in our lives - even, or especially, if it nudges us towards an uncomfortable, new, understanding of God's love.

God bless you in your discoveries!

Landscaping of Church Grounds - Update

The landscaping project was completed one week late on the 12 April. The initial delay occurred when the contractor doing the wall was unable to start when scheduled, however, our project manager ensured the delay had minimal effect on the other works.

Initially the wall was to be plain block with a cap; however, once on site, the contractor recommended that the wall be plastered to match the church, an idea that the project team agreed with. It has been left unpainted, but can be painted if necessary. We think the contractor did a good job of matching the new entrance pillars on the Tennyson St side to the existing ones on Dalton St.

We took the opportunity when the contractors uncovered the water main supply to replace the old pipe, which was corroded with a new pipe.

We will notice that the layout of gardens and lawns differ slightly from the original plan. Once the hard surfaces were laid, we agreed with the contractor to these changes to make the gardens and lawns as easy as possible to maintain. Yvonne and Lynne did a revised schedule of plants which the contractor has followed. You will notice people from the Real Garden Company on site as they have been engaged to maintain the landscaping for the next 12 months.

Financially we've come in within budget – the actual cost was \$91,266 compared to the budget of \$97,539.

When we embarked on this project, our vision for the landscaping project was for the church grounds to be welcoming, user friendly and spiritual with good connections with our city and providing a place where people can congregate and gather. We wanted a simple plan that could be implemented in stages if necessary; materials that are future proof; and the grounds designed so that minimal maintenance is required.




Our thanks go to members of the congregation for their patience and support. The completed project has made an improvement to our grounds. We hope that

Remembering Heather Craig

Heather was a very active elder, both at St David's and at St Stephen's, serving her Church and people, people, people. Over 45 years ago she formed a committee together with the Reverend Alan Goss to open a Thrift Shop (one of the very early charity shops in Napier) to provide cheaper clothing for needy families. This Shop (in Latham Street) survived for over 40 years.

Heather was also on a very early committee to begin the Cranford Hospice, remaining a very loyal supporter and fundraising for them for many years. She was also an early supporter for Swinburn House, helping them to get started in the Miller Room at St Stephen's where they stayed until they were able to purchase their own property. When the Miller Room became available again, Heather was there to set up a day care service for the elderly folk of the Parish. Together with a committee of Parishioners who helped, they set up a voluntary transport system to bring folk along to the church on a set day each week; therefore, giving relief to family caregivers by providing good care, a hot meal and entertainment. This continued for some time until other community organisations were able to take over.

As an elder, her duties included the organisation of the Hospital visiting roster and also help for families who needed meals during these times of stress. Heather also helped for many years with the Bread Run taking surplus supermarket bread products

to the Food Bank and Cranford Hospice. Many shut-in or unwell parishioners very much enjoyed visits from Heather, especially if they were unable to attend worship. When St Stephen's Parish joined with St Paul's, Heather also served as an active elder there until she was eventually blessed with the honour of Elder Emeritis. Well done good and faithful servant.

This becomes very interesting as the date of the fire which destroyed our wood church was 1929; obviously the congregation had outgrown the wooden church and were already considering a replacement.

We have not got any pictures of the brick church completed, so Louis Hay's drawing is quite an eye opener. Thank goodness we have not got to earthquake strengthen that.

Partners in God's Mission of Love

At our monthly Session meetings, the Administrative Session of the church has the opportunity to make a donation to one of the many hard-working groups who contribute so much to the life of our community. Sometimes we will have heard of a need through the grapevine or been in contact with a group and been made aware of the work they do. Other times we are able to think of the groups that do the church's work when we are unable to. We regularly give to *Foodbank* as we know the work they do greatly benefits the needy in the community, but there are a variety of lesser known charities that benefit from the church's giving too.

Recently, a session member heard about a charity called *Wrapped in Love*. This focuses on foster children who often go from place-to-place with nothing that they can call their own. The charity gives each child their own quilt in a bag which they then keep no matter how many homes they live in. So, it was a privilege to be able to help buy some fabric to make the quilts.

In March, our donation went to *Christian Lovelink*. They are a Christian-based organization whose Board and volunteers are from many different Hawke's Bay churches and denominations. They help people, referred through many agencies who need household furniture and items to make their house their home. Last year one of the recipients was *Jammies in June*. This organisation aims to ensure children living in damp, cold conditions are kept as warm as possible during the colder months by providing a pair of flannelette pyjamas.

In April, we recognised the work *Mahana House* does. We know that there are a number of our church family who suffer from dementia and have benefitted from the support provided to them and the families by *Mahana House*, so this donation, though small, acknowledged our appreciation for the work they do.

Each gift is a way of saying thank you for the love and care given to the members of the wider community, care that we would love to be able to provide ourselves, but sometimes we do not have the necessary skills, time or resources.

As well as giving these one-off donations, we support the *PSEC Guardian Angel* programme which helps children at risk in the Hawkes Bay area with a monthly donation.

Every two to six years, our NZ beech trees have what is known as a mast year. In a mast year the beech trees produce a huge crop of seeds. When these seeds mature and drop to the forest floor, they provide a real banquet for the rats and mice. With plenty to eat, these vermin breed prolifically meaning that our birds are in real danger. The vermin climb the trees, take the eggs or the young from the nest and fledglings who have perhaps dropped to the forest floor before they are fully able to fly. Once again, they are in great danger from the vermin. Some people have a vision that by 2050 NZ could be predator free. Is this just a pipe dream or is it a vision that can be achieved? The Bible says "where there is no vision the people perish".
