### **Lent Season**

Lent is the season of preparation and discipline, which begins on Ash Wednesday 26 February and concludes at sun-down on Holy Thursday 9 April. During the forty weekdays and six Sundays in Lent, the Church remembers the sacrificial life and ministry of Jesus leading to the cross, and renews its commitment to Christian discipleship.

This is the explanation of the Season of Lent according to the Common Lectionary.

Key words jump out: "preparation, discipline, remembers, ministry of Jesus, leading to the cross, renews commitment to Christian discipleship". We as Christians are each called and challenged to prepare and to discipline ourselves as we remember the sacrificial life and ministry of Jesus. Death on the cross is brutal and humiliating. Jesus died on the cross for you and for me.

It is a time also for renewing our commitment to Christ, and for our Christian discipleship. In every season we are challenged and put on the spot about our acceptance and belief in Jesus Christ as Lord and Saviour.

Lent, for me, is reminding us that our lives are measured, examined, re-examined and renewed in our commitment to Jesus Christ.

Forty days reminds me of the Israelites' forty years in the wilderness. It reminds me also of the Lord Jesus' forty days in the wilderness during his temptation. It speaks to me of all our life, our years. "Forty" is a long time. Our lives, our days, matter to God's plans for each one of us. Jesus is God's Way, Truth and Life, for you and I.

Simply put, in preparation for Jesus this Easter, unclutter, clear out, put down what you do not need to carry and unnecessarily burden yourself with. Clear your mind, let go of lingering issues, free up yourself (physically and spiritually). Lent Season reminds us that Jesus suffered and died. We need to focus on this in preparation.

Discipline in this Lent Season, for me, is about changing my life so that the Holy Spirit may be able to transform. Giving up whatever is in the way of a quality lifestyle, ie particular food, television, hoarding, idleness, over working etc. The Christian life, at all times, is a disciplined life. It must be managed well both physically and spiritually.

An afternoon tea was held in November honouring Kitty McNaughton's long and faithful service. This was attended by many from St Paul's and her son David. Kitty was presented with a certificate in recognition of becoming an Elder Emerita.



Kitty became an Elder at St Paul's in 1977, one of the first women among the congregation to do so. She is well known for her many years of pastoral visiting; always seeming to know what what was needed within the congregation; and responding in her own quiet unobtrusive way. (This often included a bunch of flowers from a bucketful in the back of her car).

Always with a desire to stay out of the limelight, her care for others extended into the wider community, who, like us, also benefited from her intelligence and wisdom.

## Miller memorial Congregational Church (Part 2)

What of buildings. The church building had recently been renovated with voluntary work by our men and was given to the



Roman Catholic church. Some of the new furniture donated by families came to St Peter's – the deacons chairs and the cross – a memorial to the Payne family and designed by Mervien Leitch. The other sanctuary items were given to the Pacific Island Church in Auckland.

The uniting service was held in the Wycliffe School hall on Sunday, 9 March 1969 when most of the members transferred their membership. It is interesting to note that 20 members of the bible class transferred as a group and there are still familiar names form that group attending here.

Looking back through the record of names, it is interesting to see names amongst the very early ones of Ennor, Crawford, Silson. The first organise was Miss Cole to become Mrs Arrell – Margaret Leitch's grandmother.

Deacons mentioned through the years have been Maynard, Ennor, Briasco, Smyrk, Ball, Anderson, McAuslin, Janes, Jarvis, Nicol, Ewen, Silson, Crawford, Cowie, Parnell and Purdom. Other names appearing through the record are Leitch, White, Duley, Mayo, Northe, Gillies and Graham.


The church building, having been given to the Roman Catholic Church, it was agreed that the equity from the sale of the manse and the land would be divided to the Haigh Hall to be called the Miller room and the balance given to the National Congregational Church.

So, 22 years later, a decision was made to replace the old Cathedral, built as a temporary building after the 1931 earthquake and to build a new worship centre. And this took place and proved very successful. The complete complex is now used by the Napier Family Centre. Following a review of church properties in Hawke's Bay and after much prayer and discussion, it was agreed that we approach St Pauls with a view to uniting and this took place with most members becoming members of St Paul's and some joining St Columbas in Taradale.

## **Interplast**

Interplast – have you heard of it? I hadn't until recently when Elizabeth Wright came to speak to the women in the knitting group at Princess Alexandra retirement village who have knitted teddy bears. These were given to Interplast through our Sales Adviser at the Village who is presently the President of her Rotary Club.

Interplast was established by Rotary in 1983 through a partnership with the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons whereby medical people (including surgeons, anaesthetists, nurses, etc) give up their annual holiday, and visit hospitals throughout the Pacific and into Asia as far as Bhutan to work with the local medics to repair bodies and rebuild lives.


Elisabeth, who has been on many such trips, showed us pictures of people (mostly children, but some adults) with terrible growths, malformed limbs and cleft palates. Some pictures would bring tears to our eyes. After corrective surgery, each child is given a knitted Teddy, and in many cases, it is their only toy. Oh, how they appreciate them. One little girl awaiting surgery saw another child return from the operating theatre with a teddy and started to cry, so she was allowed to have hers prior to surgery. Elizabeth is the go-between for doctors, parents and children and although not a medical person herself, stands with them, comforts and assures them.

But what is also good about this organisation is that they not only perform the medical procedures, they train the doctors already working there in the intricate procedures with the aim being that oneday Interplast will no longer be needed.

Asked about the equipment in the hospitals, we were told that compared to what we have in New Zealand, there is plenty of room for to upgrade and update the facilities and equipment.

We were told that at the moment they have a good supply of the Teddy Bears, but if our group makes more, they will sell them for \$20 with the money going to Interplast Funds to assist where most needed. If you would like to know more of Interplast, go to Google.
